CONFERENCE DESCRIPTION

Some of the themes that will find a place in this conference include:

- the evolution of understanding of the term 'transference' since Freud;
- current understanding of transference by practitioners in different analytic traditions;
- different views of the place of transference in the clinical situation – interpreted or not / working 'with' the transference or working 'in' the transference;
- the place of the countertransference;
- do specific issues arise around transference in different cultures? For instance, are cultural projections more difficult to name in our island culture?

PLENARY SPEAKER

Murray Stein PhD is a training and supervisory analyst at the International School for Analytical Psychology in Zurich, Switzerland. He is the author or editor of *The Principle of Individuation; Jung's Map of the Soul; Jungian Psychoanalysis; Jung's Treatment of Christianity; In Midlife, Practising Wholeness; Transformation: Emergence of the Self;* and *Solar Conscience, Lunar Conscience*. He lectures internationally on topics related to Analytical Psychology and its applications in the contemporary world. He is a graduate of Yale University, the University of Chicago, and the C.G. Jung Institut-Zurich. He is a founding member of the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts and the Chicago Society of Jungian Analysts. He has been the president of the International Association for Analytical Psychology (2001-4), and is presently a member of the Swiss Society for Analytical Psychology and has been President of the International School of Analytical Psychology. RESPONDENTS AND FACILITATORS

Richard Blennerhassett is Consultant Psychiatrist and Clinical Director at St Ita's Hospital, Portrane. He is Senior Lecturer in the Department of Psychiatry at the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. He has an ongoing interest in psychoanalysis.

Kevin Booth is a member of the Irish Forum for Child and Adolescent Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy (IFCAPP). He is a principal child and adolescent psychoanalytic psychotherapist in St Louise's, a sexual abuse assessment and treatment unit, where he coordinates the therapy team. Kevin trained in and went on to work for the Birmingham Trust for Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Child Psychotherapy Training School. Kevin teaches, lectures and supervises on the Birmingham and Trinity College Dublin child psychotherapy trainings.

Bill Callanan SJ, BA, MPhil is a Jesuit priest, as well as being both an analytical psychotherapist and family therapist. For the past twenty years he has divided his time between teaching philosophy at the Milltown Institute and his work as a psychotherapist. He holds an MPhil in Psychoanalytic Studies from Trinity College, Dublin. As well as being in private practice, he has had a long-term involvement with psychotherapy training in a variety of theoretical settings, including Jungian therapy, family therapy and humanistic-integrative approaches. He is a founder member and former Chairperson of the Irish Analytical Psychology Association.

John Foden is a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and a member of the Irish Forum for Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy, living and working in Galway. John has worked in Health Services Executive (HSE) for twenty-seven years and is currently a/director of the National Counselling Service in HSE West. John has a particular interest in the area of childhood trauma, particularly child sexual abuse and has worked with survivors and offenders of abuse. John also has an interest in working with borderline personality disorder, and the provision and development of resources for these patients within the health services.

Ann Murphy is a clinical psychologist, psychoanalytic psychotherapist and visual artist. A Clinical Lecturer in Psychiatry at Trinity College, Dublin, she was a founder and Director of the MSc in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy (TCD), where she continues as lecturer, training analyst and clinical supervisor. She also lectures at St Vincent's University Hospital, and delivers Continuing Professional Development training in Dublin and at other venues throughout Ireland. She has a private practice in Dublin.

Toni O'Brien Johnson trained as a psychoanalyst at the C.G. Jung Institute in Zurich, and has a private practice in Dun Laoghaire. She worked in Switzerland for 30 years, both as a psychoanalyst and teaching literature at the Universities of Lausanne, Geneva and Basel at various times. Her first professional training was in nursing. Since her return to Ireland, she is particularly interested in the place of culture in making meaning.

Pauline O'Callaghan has a private practice in Rathmines. She has been involved in the supervision of clinical practice and in the training of psychotherapists for many years and is a Registered Practitioner Member of the Association for Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis in Ireland (APPI). She lectures on psychoanalysis at Independent College, Dublin, Dublin Business School, and has lectured on the Masters programme in psychoanalytic psychotherapy in St Vincent's University Hospital. She was a co-ordinator on the Programme for Ongoing Formation in Freudian-Lacanian Psychoanalysis, run by the Association for Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy in Ireland (APPI) for qualified psychoanalytic psychotherapists. She has published a number of articles in *The Letter: Lacanian Perspectives on Psychoanalysis*, as well in *The Review* and in *Eisteach*.

Mary Pyle is a psychoanalytic psychotherapist in private practice in Dublin. She is a founder member of the Irish Forum for Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy. She was involved in the setting up of the MSc in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy at Trinity College Dublin, where she is a lecturer, training analyst and clinical supervisor. She is the Clinical Director of the Clinical Training Course of the Irish Institute of Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy (IIPP).

Aileen Young is a Jungian analyst working in private practice in north County Dublin. Having originally trained as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist, she pursued a training in analytical psychology and is now a member of the International Association of Analytical Psychology. Aileen has given introductory lectures in analytical psychology on many trainings, including the MSc in Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy, Trinity College, MSc in Child Art Psychotherapy, Mater Hospital, and Diploma in Psychoanalytic Studies, Dublin Business School. She is a former chairperson of the Irish Analytical Psychology Association (IAPA).
